### WORKING WITH NATURE:

John Nolen, based in Cambridge, Massachusetts, became a leader of America's pioneering generation of landscape architects and city

Before Nolen, city streets were usually laid out in boring grids. Parks and greenery

Nolen pushed to change all that. Throughout his career (1905 - 1937) he championed nature and thoughtful design.

His career began when Nolen, just a student, talked his Harvard professors into letting him skip final exams so that he could travel to Charlotte to create Independence Park.

# Landscape Planning Pioneer

In Charlotte, NC, John Nolen began a career that would make him one of America's most influential landscape planners. Over 400 projects nationwide -- neighborhoods, parks, entire cities -- show his genius. In 1905 he designed his very first project, Independence Park near uptown Charlotte. In 1911 he launched Charlotte's gracious neighborhood called Myers Park, one of the most important garden suburbs of its era. Today, John Nolen's ideas are reflected in the "New Urbanism" movement of a whole new generation of planners.
